


CONGRESSIONAL STAFF PROGRAMS



CSPP is designed to provide staffers with a more comprehensive understanding of the region and its significance to US Indo-Pacific policy. This program follows the launch of The Pacific Islands Matter for America/America Matters for the Pacific Islands, sponsored by the US Department of the Interior's Office of Insular Affairs and with support from the Congressional Pacific Islands Caucus.





CPUSJ focuses on crucial, forward-looking issues in US-Japan relations, and is designed to provide Hill staffers with advanced, cutting-edge understanding of the US-Japan relationship and its role in the region. This program is supplemented with Japan Matters for America/America Matters for Japan, and is in partnership with, and sponsored by, Sasakawa Peace Foundation USA.
